1. Opening by Vice-President Prof. HIGASHI in absence of Prof. DUPOUY.
2. U.S.S.R. is admitted in group II without discussion. Prof. VAINSTEIN thanks the Federation on behalf of the Scientific Council of the Academy of Sciences and states that there are more than 1 000 electron microscopists in U.S.S.R.

Le POOLE says there has been some discussion in the Committee Meeting whether U.S.S.R. should have three votes.

The Committee will support an application for three votes if the U.S.S.R. contribution is clearly increased by 1974, and papers announced are actually read.

The membership of Portugal is confirmed, so is the membership of D.O.R.

3. The Scandinavian and Netherlands Societies are granted two votes.

Switzerland, Australia and Israel take the opportunity to ask for two votes.

Le POOLE reminds the Assembly that art. III of the Constitution that "the group in which a Society adheres should reflect the international contribution to electron microscopy" and is not based mainly on membership numbers. An application to the Executive Committee should therefore be endorsed by a statement on international contribution.

4. The Record of the Assembly in Kyoto is accepted without discussion.
5. The Report on activities 1966-1970 is accepted without discussion.
6. The Financial report 1966-1970 is accepted without discussion, subject however to the audition of Drs. FAVARO and WEGMANN before January 1st, 1971.
7. The revised budget is accepted without discussion after Le POOLE's statement that the Federation can give some, if little, financial support to participants of the Pacific Regional Meeting, hopefully to be held in Los Angeles 1972, if the E.M.S.A. cannot provide this support.
8. After the apologies by Le POOLE to have messed-up arrangements for the 1972 European Regional Meeting, Prof. DHAD (Israel) asks for a secret ballot on this matter.

Votes : 22 GREAT BRITAIN, 12 ISRAEL, 1 blank. G.B. accepted.

The invitation for the World Meeting 1974 by the Australia Society is accepted unanimously

The Meeting will, most probably, be held in Canberra
Dr. FARRANT explains that an Int. Crystallographic Union Meeting will take place in the third week of August 1974, immediately preceding the E.M. Conference. Programmes will be coordinated. Weather conditions (early spring) are expected to be very acceptable. Fares to Australia can be reduced.

The 1976 European Regional Meeting is discussed at length. A secret ballot on this matter runs as follows :

The 1976 European Regional Meeting will be in ISRAEL.

Many delegates feel that the decision is too early. The Executive Committee will advise on two alternatives :

- a. Have Assembly Meetings every 2 years.
- b. Vote by post.

The Executive Committee strongly recommends that the number of papers read at a conference should be less than 30 % of the number of participants. Referees, preferably at least two, should indicate an order in quality of contributions. The receiving Society shall than allow the proper number of papers to be read.

With the understanding that 30 % means about 30 % (amendment SIKORSKI) the Assembly accepts the Committees recommendation as a condition for sponsorship by I.F.S.E.M. This avoids embarrassment for the receiving Society. The rejected papers should be printed.

9. Election the President :

Le POOLE explains that the Executive Committee has come to the conclusion that the tradition to elect a President from the host-society of the next International Meeting has many disadvantages. Past Presidents confirmed this. In the case of Prof. DUPOUY disadvantage showed up nearly disastrous. With full understanding for the feelings of Dr. FARRANT, Le POOLE states that the earlier this tradition is broken, the better.

Dr. FARRANT tells the Assembly, that he accepted the consequences personally, but that there may be repercussions in the financial aspects.
